### FCC TO REINSTATE MORSE CODE TEST

"It was a big mistake eliminating the Morse Code test," admits FCC official

Washington, D.C. – April 1, 2014 - Today, the Federal Communications Commission (Commission or FCC) approved Report and Order 14-987af which reinstates the Morse Code test for General Class and Amateur Extra Class licensees. "It was a big mistake eliminating the Morse Code test," admits Dotty Dasher, the FCC's director of examinations. "We now realize that being able to send and receive Morse Code is an essential skill for radio amateurs. As they say, it really does get through when other modes can't."

Not only will new applicants have to take the test, but General Class licensees who have never passed a code test will have one year to pass a 5-wpm code test. Similarly, Amateur Extra class licensees that never passed a code test will have one year to pass a 13-wpm test. Those amateurs that fail to pass the test will face revocation of their operating privileges. Materials for administering the examinations will be distributed to Volunteer Examiner Coordinators by the end of April, so that they can begin the testing on May 1, 2014.

"This isn't going to be one of those silly multiple-choice type tests," noted Dasher. "We're going to be sending five-character random code groups, just like we did in the old days. And, applicants will have to prove that they can send, too, using a poorly adjusted straight key."

Technician Class licensees will not be required to take a Morse Code test, nor will a test be required for new applicants. "We discussed it," said Dasher, "but decided that since most Techs can't even figure out how to program their HTs, requiring them to learn Morse Code seemed like cruel and unusual punishment."

When asked what other actions we might see from the FCC, Dasher hinted that in the future applicants taking the written exam may be required to draw circuit diagrams, such as Colpitts oscillators and diode ring mixers, once again. "We're beginning to think that if an applicant passes an amateur radio license exam it should mean that he or she actually knows something," she said.

## **Antenna Analyzers**



Cam W7CAM on Antenna Analyzers

Cam Cushing, W7CAM, presented the topic for the March meeting: antenna analyzers. Using a slide show and some actual equipment (some provided by Mitch WB0GBI and the AARC equipment committee), he covered both theory and practical information on how to use an antenna analyzer to adjust an antenna for peak performance. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to provide as much practical information as he'd originally intended. His car broke down on the way to the meeting and, though he'd gotten a ride, he'd forgotten to

transfer the dipole that he was going to use as a demo. Nevertheless, he managed to make do with a handy talky with a standard rubber ducky, so he was still able to give an informative talk.

Cam started his talk by asking the rhetorical question, "why is tuning important?" (Ans: So they can hear you.) He then elaborated on this by pointing out that you tune an antenna to get maximum power from the transmitter to the antenna, and maximum sensitivity while receiving.

## Club Meeting Minutes - March 14, 2013

Bill WA9ASD, Secretary AARC

The meeting was called to order at 7:08 PM by the President Adam. KDØMMG by saying the Pledge of Allegiance followed with introductions by name and call. There were 29 attendees.

He went on to discuss some theory, including the four measures of antenna tuning (impedance matching, reflection coefficient, return loss, and SWR) and the importance of imaginary numbers in analyzing how reflected signals contribute to standing waves. Using animated slides, he demonstrated the concept behind reflection coefficient and the equations used to describe it and standing wave ratio. (For details, see http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Reflection\_coefficient)

Though the theory behind a standing wave can be complex, Cal pointed out that the circuits for measuring it are quite simple when considering the voltage component of the wave (VSWR). He then went on to discuss some of the practical considerations of tuning antennas. This included the location—why it's important to tune the antenna where it's to be used—and how it's loaded.

As an example, he pointed out that the impedance of your head affects the loading of a hand-held transceiver and that handy-talky manufacturers take that into account when they design their products. Cal demonstrated this by using an Autek analyzer and showing how the VSWR of a rubber duck antenna varied when held his head and when held away and gripped in his hand (it went up). He went on to other practical matters such as what parts of an antenna can be used to tune it. As noted at the beginning, he was only able to show some drawings as he didn't have the demo antenna with him.

He was, however, able to demonstrate some analyzers. This included the aforementioned Autek (\$180), the club's MFJ-259 (\$300), and the Agilant N9923 (\$25,000). The latter instrument was the


most interesting, as it can produce digital readouts, waveforms, and real-time graphs of

the antenna being measured. The session ended with a Q&A session and general discussion about the relative

merits of antenna analyzers, basic VSWR bridges, and grid dip meters. In all, it was an entertaining and educational evening.

Note: Besides spending his free time tuning amateur radio antennas, Cam has spent his professional time tuning MRI scanners and working with other medical equipment for such organizations as ScanMed of Resonance Innovations LLC, the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, and Iowa State University.]

The program for our April meeting will be "Everything you wanted to know about....." which is being given by some members of our club. Be sure to attend to see this intriguing program.

I worked *CQ* magazine's WPX contest last weekend. This is a DX contest where you try to work as many different call sign prefixes as you can on the 160 through 10 meter bands.

The 10, 15, and 20 meter bands were really packed with DX stations. Working just some of the contest I easily managed to contact 74 counties. The 10 meter band was open well after sunset, and the 20 meter band was open for DX until about 1:30 AM local time. The point of this is that the upper ham bands have had very good propagation lately, which should continue for some time. We seem to be entering a second sunspot peak in this cycle, so if you like to work DX or just get on the upper bands, now is the time.

In celebration of the 100th anniversary of the ARRL, members of the ARRL are selected to operate the ARRL's call sign in each state from their own station for a week at two different times during 2014. If you contact W1AW in all 50 states, you can get a great certificate from the ARRL showing that you have attained your WAS award (Worked All States) working only W1AW. This is a once in a hundred years opportunity! The weekly schedule of two states each week is on the ARRL web site as are the other details. And if you miss a state one week, it will be on one other week during the year. So far I have worked W1AW in 9 states, and it is easy to do because of the good band conditions lately.

Remember the local 10 meter net on Thursdays at 8 PM on 28.350. It is a great opportunity if you have a Tech license to get on HF. Anybody is welcome as well. There is a local 6 meter net on Tuesday at 8:00 PM on 50.200 that some of our members check in to as well. They are both friendly nets where you can check out how well your rigs and different antennas are working.
