Art presented a slide show about his visit to the ARRL headquarters while attending a Section Manager's Workshop. This included pictures of the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station, the W1AW antenna farm, displays of Go-Kits, a rotary spark transmitter, a D-Star system, the ARRL Testing Lab, the QSL Bureau, and others.

Art mentioned that—while he was at the workshop—he helped Harold Kramer, WJ1B, to get his WAS for 20 meters via the Internet. Harold only need a QSO from Nebraska so Art connected his laptop to the ARRL HQ LAN, brought up his station at home, and made the contact with WJ1B, who was operating in the same building. As Art told us, he was transmitting from Nebraska, but "with a long mike cord."

Art concluded his presentation by pointing out that the popularity of ham radio is on the rise—both nationwide and in Nebraska. He thanked the Club for its participation in community events and emergency services. He urged members to contact him (k0aiz@arrl.org) if they had constructive criticism or needed help for anything related to amateur radio.

W8CI-Michael Kalter, General Chairman of Hamvention 2011, appeared with guest VU2RBI- Devulapalli Bharathi Prasad, Chief Coordinator from the National Institute of Amateur Radio, India (see her extensive biography on QRZ.com). Mike said attendees this year included people from China, Qatar, Tunisia, Germany, Japan, Great Britain, Vietnam, Korea, and other countries. He said it takes almost 300 volunteers working all year to make Hamvention happen. Bharathi was a Dayton award winner a few years ago, has assisted through relief activities after the Tsunami in 2004 and recently after the Japanese Tsunami. This was her 3rd visit to Dayton; she has been a ham for 30 years (licensed at the age of 20 in 1980) and has gone on 6 expeditions. She is active on HF (14200) and is planning an expedition to Nicobar.

Tom interviewed (gravity call **KF5BOC**; antigravity call **NA1SS**) **Astronaut Col. Doug Wheelock** (Commander of Expedition 25 of the International Space Station) live Friday and Saturday. Tom personally talked to Col. Wheelock 28 times while Doug was aboard the ISS. Tom also sent Memphis BBQ to Doug when he landed and was in quarantine in Houston. Tom presented Doug with a "Worked Nearly all Memphis Certificate." Doug hopes to get another command in 3 to 4 years and stated, if he gets a chance to get back (to the ISS), he would add stations and would "get that Nearly scratched off." When Tom asked Doug how he wanted to be logged in on 5KUB, he said as "astro_wheels" (on Twitter as @astro_wheels). Doug discussed food, contacts, learning to float, commercial space providers, technical problems, scary moments, ISS radio gear, auroras, and operations on the ISS. Doug said he's not good at answering mail on Twitter, but he does try to send pictures from space. Doug signed an autograph for KJ4SLS-John Moroney (at the booth). He said the space program belongs to all of us and we should be proud of it. Doug said he had the time of his life on board the Space Station communicating around the globe. Doug was an excellent speaker. Be sure to catch the entire interview on W5KUB.com.

KØAIZ on the ARRL and Amateur Radio



The speaker for the June meeting was Nebraska Section Manager Art Zygielbaum, KØAIZ, who talked about ham radio and activities at the ARRL.

Art started the presentation by mentioning that ham radio had been around for 100 years and that he'd gotten his first amateur license (WV6SAL) 50 years ago at age 14. He asked the audience if there were anyone present who'd also been a ham for at least 50 years and if there were any lifetime ARRL members. For each one that raised their hand, he awarded them with a copy of

the *ARRL Repeater Directory 2011-2012*. There weren't many recipients as attendance was sparse that night, so he asked for a show of hands of regular ARRL members and got a better response.

The last time Art spoke before the Club (*Ham Hum*, October 2010), he described several ham-related projects that were in the works; this time, he brought us up to date on the status of some. For example, legislation to authorize storm spotters to use flashing amber lights on their vehicles and NEMA ID cards for emergency volunteers, are uncertain. Others, such as ARES/RACES restructuring and a ham emergency communications network are still progressing. The latter project is based on D-Star but would be independent of the Internet. Though Art's worried that politics may slow progress on that project, he's still expecting three new systems to be ready in the next six months. One system is already operational in a Lincoln hospital.

Art discussed "why we're hams" and played a video of Walter Chronkite, KB2GSD, who described one reason: Helping out during a disaster when other forms of communications are down. After the video, Art pointed out that hams had done well in the recent tornadoes in Missouri, Alabama, and Georgia. He emphasized what Walter said in the video, hams truly are "the last line of defense." (You can view the video at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5Z9136_Nhh4)

Dayton 2011 via W5KUB – Celebrity Interviews

(This is Part II of a two-part article by Christina NØRIS on her experiences as a remote moderator of the W5KUB chat room at the 2011 Dayton Hamvention. Part I [May, 2011 issue] presented a moderator's-eye-view of some of the events at Dayton, while this article concludes with summaries of interviews of some of the better-known hams that attended.)

KB3LEZ-Garrison Kunst, a 17 year old from Pennsylvania, discussed plans for his **Youth Forum** talk about hiking and ham radio. Garrison got into ham radio at 10 or 11 years old. It took Garrison 13 tries (his new lucky number) to get his license.

N8VES-Sam Anderson made a brief appearance Friday. Sam has attended Hamvention with his **antenna hard-hat** for more than 15 years. It took 3 days to build his hat; he wanted “to be the person you just had to stop and see.” Sam gave a demonstration of the “real, 3-foot, crank-up tower on a hat.” Sam is a member of DARA and volunteers for Hamvention.

KØNEB-Joe Eisenberg (cat-in-the-hat) appeared on Friday and gave a rundown of his 32nd trip to Hamvention. He said they had about 100 persons in the kit-building forum with guest speakers including **WØXI-Phil Anderson** (speaking about an attenuator kit) and **KI6DS-Doug Hendricks** (with a simple code-practice oscillator kit and an antenna dipper). Elecraft revealed the brand new KX3 which is a hand-held, all-mode (built-in AM, FM, CW, Sideband, PSK31, Teletype), HF, 10-Watt transceiver. It has all the functions of an SDR; you can use RIT control and logging programs. The KX3 will be out around the end of the year. Elecraft will also have a 100-Watt amplifier. Of course Joe mentioned CQ-amateur-radio.com.

On Saturday, **AD8N-Wally Wright**, the **1978 DARA Chairman** stopped by to speak at 5KUB carrying a sign with his call letters on it. Some chat room attendees commented (another odd-ball?) until he was identified. Wally spoke to us via Tom’s interview microphone, joking that people could always find him (the sign was taller than him), and said the sign actually is an antenna for his transceiver.

We had a visit from a man in a full (Apollo) space suit, with a backpack and hand-carried antenna. The suit’s ATV transmitter (broadband on 427) put out intermod and caused severe sync buzz. There was complaining in the chat room. When Tom was off screen, **Spacesuit Man** “hammed it up” saying: “Eenie meenie miney moe, how do you hear my radio? Fee fie foe fum, 5 by 9 and no hum.” I did not catch Spacesuit’s name or call. Tom mentioned talking with the Chairman of the FCC earlier that day and joked about Spacesuit Man being shut down for the hum. The get-up was outstanding! When asked, Tom told Spacesuit Man that WiFi does not work at Hamvention. Instead, he uses a 6 Gig link coming from outside and an Ethernet. 5KUB has tried but can’t go wireless at Hamvention even for a distance of 20 feet.
